On August 29, 2002, [REDACTED], ISN [REDACTED], date of birth 1977; place of birth Medina, Saudi Arabia, was interviewed at [REDACTED] Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, by Federal Bureau of Investigation Special Agent [REDACTED], [REDACTED] Lieutenant [REDACTED], United States Army, provided Arabic/English translation. After being advised as to the identities of the interviewing agents and the nature of the interview, [REDACTED] voluntarily provided the following information:

[REDACTED] went to the market in Medina (date unrecalled) to purchase a videotape which chronicles the battles in Chechnya; after viewing this tape, which contained a segment regarding a fatwa, [REDACTED] wished to travel to Chechnya and fight with fellow Muslims. [REDACTED]'s friends in the Medina neighborhood advised that an individual residing in the local area, identified as [REDACTED] had fought in Chechnya and was encouraging Saudis to go to Chechnya. [REDACTED] made contact with [REDACTED], a Saudi, approximately thirty (30) years of age, sporting a beard. [REDACTED] was employed at a carpet cleaning store in the neighborhood of Dawar Elsalam, Medina. [REDACTED] was advised by [REDACTED] that prior to traveling to Chechnya to fight, [REDACTED] was required to obtain military training. [REDACTED] provided a telephone number (not further identified) to [REDACTED] of [REDACTED]; [REDACTED] was advised to contact [REDACTED] when he was ready to begin his military training in Afghanistan.

[REDACTED] was told by [REDACTED] to shaved off his beard. [REDACTED] sold his automobile, packed a suitcase, drove to Ryahd, Saudi Arabia, and made contact with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] met [REDACTED] for breakfast the following day and took [REDACTED] to the Pakistan Embassy to obtain the proper visa for travel to Pakistan. [REDACTED] instructed [REDACTED] to contact a specific individual in the Embassy (not further identified) in order to obtain this visa. [REDACTED] made contact with this individual and returned later that same afternoon to pick up his visa. [REDACTED] dropped [REDACTED] at a resthouse (not further identified) and then procured an airline ticket for [REDACTED]'s travel to Kuwait. [REDACTED] instructed [REDACTED] that two (2) other individuals would be making the trip to Kuwait with [REDACTED]: [REDACTED], a twenty-eight (28) year old Saudi Arabian national, as well as [REDACTED], a Saudi Arabian national who was over thirty (30) years old, sporting a full beard. 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was advised that the trio was to travel separately and was not to be seen together.

Prior to proceeding to Kuwait, [REDACTED] was provided with two (2) cell phone numbers (which [REDACTED] could not recall): (1) [REDACTED], in Lahore Pakistan, and (2) [REDACTED], in Medina, Saudi Arabia, whom [REDACTED] was to call if there were any problems in contacting [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] was advised that upon arriving in Pakistan, he was to contact [REDACTED]. The trio remained in Kuwait for approximately three (3) or four (4) hours and then flew onto Lahore, Pakistan. The trio obtained a taxi and proceeded to the Lahore Hotel and checked into their rooms.

In the lobby of this hotel, [REDACTED] met [REDACTED] (not further identified) and [REDACTED] (not further identified). Both [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were fellow Saudis; during their conversation, [REDACTED] learned that the duo were also had called to meet [REDACTED] and travel to Afghanistan.

From the Lahore Hotel, [REDACTED] made contact with [REDACTED]; [REDACTED] arrived at the hotel soon thereafter. [REDACTED] spoke with [REDACTED] and advised [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] to proceed to their room, where he would meet with them later that same evening. [REDACTED] spoke with [REDACTED] and his trio and advised them to provide [REDACTED] with funds so that he could purchase their tickets to travel to Quetta, Pakistan. [REDACTED] left the hotel and later returned with food and airline tickets. [REDACTED] provided clothing to [REDACTED] because [REDACTED] was attracting undue attention based on his Saudi attire. [REDACTED] learned that [REDACTED] was contacted by [REDACTED] with advanced notice of the trio's arrival.

The following day, [REDACTED] hailed a taxi from the hotel and the trio proceeded to the airport, where they proceeded to fly onto Quetta, Pakistan. [REDACTED] advised the trio that upon landing at the airport, they would be met at the airport by someone who would explain their future travel. After landing in Quetta, the trio went to the front of the airport, but did not notice any individuals waiting for them. [REDACTED] contacted [REDACTED] and explained that the individual was not present to meet the trio at the airport as planned. [REDACTED] advised that he would contact [REDACTED] and that [REDACTED] was to re-contact [REDACTED] in a few minutes. [REDACTED] re-contacted [REDACTED], who advised that a Syrian, light skin, early 30's, described as a "white guy" would be with a "Saudi" and that [REDACTED] and the trio should be on the lookout for them at the airport. [REDACTED] located the pair shortly thereafter; the Saudi was identified as [REDACTED]; the Syrian individual was unidentified.

[REDACTED] and his trio were taken by a vehicle provided by the unidentified Syrian. The trio proceeded to an unknown location; at this location, [REDACTED] and the Syrian obtained one rickshaw; [REDACTED] and the two other individuals obtained a second rickshaw. The group proceeded to Daftar Taliban Madafa guesthouse in Quetta. The group remained at this guesthouse for several days. While at this guesthouse, [REDACTED] advised that two (2) Toyota Corolla vehicles would come to the house, and leave with guests. On the final day, [REDACTED] advised that [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] left in one of the vehicles; [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] departed in a second vehicle. [REDACTED] learned that the Syrian individual had departed the residence earlier this same

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day for Khandahar; [REDACTED] never saw this individual again. The two vehicles departed Quetta early in the morning and passed through the Pakistani/Afghani border without stopping.

After arriving in Afghanistan, [REDACTED] and his colleagues were dropped off in a parking lot, with shops (not further identified) and after they were dropped off, the vehicles departed the scene towards Pakistan. [REDACTED] advised that shortly thereafter, two vehicles, described as a pickup truck, and a micro-bus with a rear seat, picked up the trio and drove them to the Madafa guesthouse in Khandahar, Afghanistan. [REDACTED], a Yemeni, was in charge of the Madafa guesthouse. [REDACTED] noticed a bulletin in this residence which advertised the existence of additional training available to interested parties; this training included artillery and heavy weapons training. Upon arriving, the guard at the front of the residence obtained the trio's names, took their bags, provided them lunch, and led them to a room to wait. At approximately 6pm, the trio was allowed to take a shower and then were led to meet with [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] asked the trio why they were at his guesthouse; after they replied that they were there for military training, [REDACTED] inquired as to whether the trio was anxious to begin their training. The trio replied that they were anxious to begin their training as soon as possible. [REDACTED] advised they could put their valuables, such as their passports, money, and tickets into his safe. [REDACTED] placed his valuables in this safe. The trio remained at this guesthouse for a number of days; during their stay, they did not receive any type of military training.

At approximately 7am on the day of departure, the trio advised that they would be leaving to travel to the AL FARUQ training camp.

The trio arrived at the camp with approximately twenty (20) other individuals. These individuals originated in Saudi Arabia, Pakistan, Sudan, as well as Russia. At this camp, the group were staged in a receiving area, told to wait, and were interviewed individually regarding their personal information. The group was advised that it would be a two (2) month training cycle, which would be conducted as a group. The group learned that their trainer would be [REDACTED], a Filipino, 5 feet tall, who spoke fluent Arabic. [REDACTED] explained to the group that they would be required to adhere to strict orders, and that [REDACTED] would be the trainer throughout the two (2) month cycle. [REDACTED] was described by [REDACTED] as "laid back" and very easy-going. [REDACTED] added that the new trainees were assigned to physical security duties of the camp at nighttime.

[REDACTED] explained that during the training cycle, other groups would arrive and would be trained as a unit for their two (2) month cycle. A typical day was described as rising at 6am to pray and read the Koran, followed by a physical training session, showering, and then breakfast. After breakfast, the group would report for formation, where they received military training, including weaponry, by their primary instructor [REDACTED], a Yemeni. [REDACTED] did not receive any political or religious training. [REDACTED] was identified as the individual in charge of the entire camp. Near the

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end of the training cycle, [REDACTED] became ill and was taken to a hospital in Kabul, Afghanistan. [REDACTED] replacement (not further identified) subjected the group to very harsh physical training; due to this, [REDACTED] departed the camp two (2) weeks early. [REDACTED] advised that he did not expect the training to be so difficult. [REDACTED] advised that he was in the middle of the desert, lacking proper nutrition, and would be awakened in the middle of the night for training exercises. [REDACTED] advised that on one side of the camp, he was able to view individuals training on artillery, and that on the other side of the camp, he would see individuals conducting infantry tactical training. [REDACTED] advised that the graduating class would put on an offensive tactics demonstration for the other students and would also conduct a live fire of weapons for the students. While at this camp, [REDACTED] advised that he did not recall any individuals of importance visiting the camp. [REDACTED] advised that he was at the camp four and one half (4 -1/2) months prior to September 11, 2001.

[REDACTED] and [REDACTED] decided that they would leave the hardship of the camp and travel to the front lines to obtain first-hand battle experience. They received permission to leave the camp by [REDACTED]. After arriving in Kabul, they spent one night at the Qhandahra madaffa. [REDACTED] sent [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] to (the same parking lot when they first arrived in Afghanistan) a parking lot in the Wazir Akbar Khan neighborhood in Kabul to make arrangements to go to the front lines. The duo met with [REDACTED], who was a Saudi Arabian national in charge of the Arab House (not further identified) in this neighborhood. The duo remained at this house for two (2) or three (3) days. While at this residence, [REDACTED] contacted his family to assure them that he was alive and safe. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] departed the residence after three (3) days on a micro-bus, which transported the duo and ten (10) additional individuals to the front lines North of Kabul, Afghanistan.

[REDACTED] described the front line as containing fighting positions, trenches and bunkers manned by various nationalities. [REDACTED] advised that each nationality was assigned a section of the line. The leader of the front line was an Egyptian by the name of [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] remained on the front lines for approximately five (5) months. During this time, an Imam by the name of [REDACTED] would preach and lecture to the front line troops to boost their morale. [REDACTED] advised that he was never involved in direct fighting, though he was involved in drills in preparation for an attack. [REDACTED] advised that his training involved the assembly and disassembly of AK-47 rifles, as well as the rocket-propelled grenade launcher. [REDACTED] reiterated that he never fired any of these weapons while on the front line. [REDACTED] advised that while on this front line, he learned of the September 11, 2001, attacks. [REDACTED] departed the front line approximately one and one-half (1-1/2) months later.

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██████████ advised that he saw American planes attack other positions in Afghanistan. ██████████ advised that when he saw these planes, they would leave their front line positions at night for their safety and return during the daylight hours. Approximately one (1) kilometer behind the front line in Kabul, ██████████ advised that there was a secondary line consisting of artillery positions. ██████████ added that this was the troop's fallback position in case of a retreat.

██████████ identified the following individuals as being on the front line of fighting with him: ██████████, ██████████ (a Yemeni), ██████████ (a Syrian), and ██████████ (not further identified).

In November of 2001, ██████████ and 20 others retreated in the troop supply vehicle to Kabul to a rented house. The house, outside of Wazir Akbar Khan, was rented to avoid being bombed by the U.S. After arriving in Kabul, ██████████ called his home. ██████████'s family requested that he return to Saudi Arabia immediately for his safety. ██████████ agreed that this was a good idea; however, he recalled that his valuables were left behind in Khandahar. ██████████ found ██████████ and related to ██████████ that ██████████ needed to return to Saudi Arabia. While talking to ██████████, ██████████ was informed that the front line North of Khandahar had been breached by the Northern Alliance. ██████████ advised that all the passports held in Khandahar were transferred to Knost, Afghanistan. ██████████ advised that ██████████ had rented a building which housed approximately twenty (20) individuals who appeared to be new recruits. These individuals were divided by ██████████ into two (2) groups: one (1) of the groups would be headed to Khandahar and the second, containing ██████████, was headed to Khost.

On his first day in Khost, ██████████ requested his passport; however, he was advised that nobody knew the whereabouts of his passport. ██████████ was at this location and advised ██████████ that he would need to travel to a village (not further identified) in Pakistan to pick up his passport. ██████████ advised that two (2) Afghani guides (not further identified) would lead ██████████ and twenty-nine (29) others to the Pakistani border and then to the village where ██████████ could pick up his passport. ██████████ advised that the group walked for approximately eight (8) days toward the Pakistani border. On the eighth (8) day, the group arrived at a "mudbrick" building (not further identified) where they were fed. The guides then broke the group into five-man teams, directed them to walk down the trail in these teams. The teams were advised that the next team could depart as soon as the prior team was "out of sight." The teams were advised that at the end of this trail, there would be a bus, which would transport the teams to the village where they could pick up their passports. Prior to departing, the groups paid the Afghani guides for the bus which would be waiting for them. As the teams were crossing the Pakistani border, the teams were arrested by the Pakistani military. All thirty (30) of the individuals were captured. ██████████ advised that a Pakistani Captain told the group that he knew why they were there and told them to surrender. ██████████ advised that the group was very fatigued from

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the trip; [REDACTED] further advised that at no time were the subjects of Taliban, Al-Qa'eda, nor Usama Bin Laden discussed.

[REDACTED] advised that during the trip, the group saw American planes flying overhead and also noticed flashes of light in the distance; [REDACTED] surmised that these lights were the result of American bombing raids.

[REDACTED] was allowed to view a Camp Delta Detainee photo book containing photos of the other individuals arrested with him at the border. [REDACTED] identified ten members of his traveling party: ISN# [REDACTED], ISN# [REDACTED], ISN# [REDACTED], ISN# [REDACTED], ISN# [REDACTED], ISN# [REDACTED], ISN# [REDACTED], and ISN# [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] advised that the individuals were taken to a Pakistani prison, where they were fed and then transported a prison in Branchinar, Pakistan. At this prison in Brahncinar, the warden of the prison informed the group that the best thing the group could tell the Americans was that they were in Afghanistan for a dawi in teaching Islam. The warden was described as wearing civilian clothes, spoke minimal Arabic, early forties (40s), approximately five feet six inches (5'6") tall, large build, approximately two-hundred two (202) pounds, light hair, light skin, of Pakistani descent. [REDACTED] advised that during his time in Afghanistan, he utilized the movement name [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] advised that when he was first captured, he told the Americans that he was in Pakistan conducting a dawi, based on the instructions received in Pakistan. Other detainees in [REDACTED] advised [REDACTED] not to change his story.

[REDACTED] advised that if he returns to Saudi Arabia, he would get married and obtain a job. [REDACTED] regrets leaving his family behind and traveling to Afghanistan; [REDACTED] advised that as the eldest son, he should have been at home taking care of his family. [REDACTED] advised that he has no interest in traveling to Chechnya and that he has never had hard feelings towards the Americans.

[REDACTED] advised that he decided to tell the Americans the truth now as they told him that he should remember his family and that he felt sorry that he had walked away from his responsibilities to his family. [REDACTED] is sorry for his family at this time and apologized to the interviewers at not being truthful sooner.

On 01MAY02 and 04MAY02, SALIM AHMED SALIM HAMDAN, a.k.a. SUQR AL-JEDDAWI, (ISN [REDACTED]-00149 [REDACTED]), was interviewed at [REDACTED] Guantanamo Bay, Cuba by Detective [REDACTED], NYPD, Special Agent [REDACTED], Language Specialist [REDACTED].

After being advised of the identity of the interviewers and the nature of the interview, HAMDAN provided the following information.

HAMDAN is approximately 32 years of age and was born in [REDACTED], Yemen

HAMDAN stated he trained at the Al Farouq Camp approximately two and one half years ago. According to HAMDAN, an individual named [REDACTED] was in charge of the camp at that time. He indicated he was at the camp for approximately 30 to 40 days. Although he liked the training, he indicated he did not do well. HAMDAN stated that an individual named [REDACTED] encouraged him to go to Afghanistan. [REDACTED] helped HAMDAN obtain a visa.

HAMDAN indicated that while at Al Farouq, other individuals were there training for specific missions. HAMDAN indicated that he was not aware of what operations were planned. He did specify that the training consisted of mines, explosives, rockets, and heavy artillery. He stated he did not receive any of this training. HAMDAN did state that those receiving this specific training were located in a different area of the camp.

When HAMDAN attended Al Farouq, [REDACTED] was in charge of the camp. One of the trainers at the camp was identified as [REDACTED]. HAMDAN was in the camp for 30 to 40 days the first time he attended Al Farouq. The second time he went he was there for approximately two weeks.

HAMDAN stated that approximately one week prior to September 11, USAMA BIN LADEN (UBL) talked about an operation was going to occur. UBL did not discuss the location or the details of the operation. The conversation took place in one of UBL's vehicles, while they were driving somewhere in Kabul. [REDACTED], [REDACTED], was also in the vehicle at the time. HAMDAN also stated that several of UBL's guards had heard about the operation from UBL in a guesthouse in Kabul known as the MOHAMMED SALEH guesthouse. HAMDAN stated he asked the guards about what UBL had said and they indicated they were aware that an operation was going to take place. He also indicated that Dr. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were also present at the Kabul guesthouse at the time. HAMDAN provided the following names of the guards that were present:

HAMDAN did not believe that [REDACTED] was present at this time.

HAMDAN stated he was with UBL up until two days before the September 11. Those last two days before the operation he did not know where UBL went. HAMDAN indicated he was at the Arab guesthouse in Kabul. [REDACTED] ran the guesthouse. He recalled seeing UBL the day after the operation. After the operation, HAMDAN stated [REDACTED] was with UBL at the time. HAMDAN recalled asking UBL the day after September 11 if that was the operation UBL was talking about. HAMDAN stated that UBL told him that it was the operation. HAMDAN also recalled that the first place UBL went to after September 11 was a camp located in a village outside of Kabul called Loughar.

HAMDAN was present for the making of a video by UBL outside of Kabul after September 11. He believes it was at the camp located at Loughar. UBL talked about the Americans, Jews, and the Jihad. HAMDAN believes that [REDACTED] was present for the making of this video. When asked how the video was delivered to Al Jeezera television, HAMDAN stated that Al Jeezera made the video.

HAMDAN was shown a series of photographs of some of the GTMO detainees. He identified the following:

[REDACTED], [REDACTED] - HAMDAN stated he saw this individual in Kabul at the Saudi Embassy House.

[REDACTED], [REDACTED] - HAMDAN stated he saw this individual in Kabul.

[REDACTED], [REDACTED] - HAMDAN stated this mans name was [REDACTED] and he was seen in Jalalabad.

[REDACTED], [REDACTED] - HAMDAN stated he saw this individual in Kabul.

[REDACTED], [REDACTED] - HAMDAN stated this man is one of UBL's bodyguards. His name is [REDACTED] and he is from Yemen.

[REDACTED], [REDACTED] - HAMDAN identified this individual as [REDACTED] and that he was married to [REDACTED] aka [REDACTED].

[REDACTED], [REDACTED] - HAMDAN identified this individual as [REDACTED] aka [REDACTED]. Identified by HAMDAN as a UBL bodyguard.

On 2/18/02, [redacted] born on [redacted], born in [redacted] was interviewed at [redacted] Guantanamo Bay Cuba. Present at the interview with SA [redacted] and SA [redacted]. After [redacted] was advised of the nature of the interview and the identity of the interviewing Agents, [redacted] provided the following information:

[redacted] stated he had heard that [redacted] was giving detainees \$100 once in custody in Pakistan. [redacted] did not know if [redacted] is a Qaeda member. [redacted] noted that he had heard of [redacted] as being an [redacted] at the Kabul front line, however [redacted] never saw him. [redacted] also advised that he did not know if [redacted] was in Tora Bora. [redacted] advised that he had heard while in Kabul and while in Tora Bora that the Al-Qaeda leaders are spread out in Afghanistan with some located in Khost, Qandahar, Tora Bora and other areas.

[redacted] advised that [redacted], who was in charge of [redacted] position in Tora Bora, informed him that [redacted] had relocated from Tora Bora to Khost. [redacted] stated he believes that the the name [redacted] was given because [redacted] was a very good shooter.

[redacted] stated that once in Afghanistan, he wrote up a will and gave it to [redacted] at the Kart Barwan guest house in Kabul. [redacted] explained that he did not fill out an application with his biographical information once in Afghanistan, because he did not attend any training. [redacted] stated such a procedure is only for people who train at USAMA BIN LADEN (UBL) camps [redacted] is aware that [redacted] was a leader at the front line in Kabul.

[redacted] advised that [redacted] always tried to convince fighters to give Bayat to UBL. [redacted] met [redacted] at the front line. [redacted] spoke to Mujahedeen about fighting MASSOUD's troops in Afghanistan, saying that MASSOUD promised the European League that he is the last defense for the west against and he should be defeated.

Three weeks prior to the 9/11/01 attacks, _____ heard from _____ (UBL supporter) while in Kabul, that _____ had a disagreement with USAMA BIN LADEN (UBL) regarding the upcoming attacks on the U.S. _____ was of the opinion that the upcoming attacks will harm Mujahedeen and the Islamic state in Afghanistan. _____ stated that most of the Arab brothers on the front line and in guest houses knew about an attack to take place, however no one knew the nature of the attack.

_____ explained that _____, 5'8", well built, approximately 40 years of age. _____, 5'6", medium built, approximately 30 years of age and _____, 5'5", athletic built, 25 years of age, went to the north and had a combative mind. All were supporting UBL's prospective that such attacks against the Americans should take place.

_____ was shown the _____ of the GTMO detainees, _____ and he provided the following:

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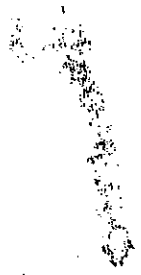

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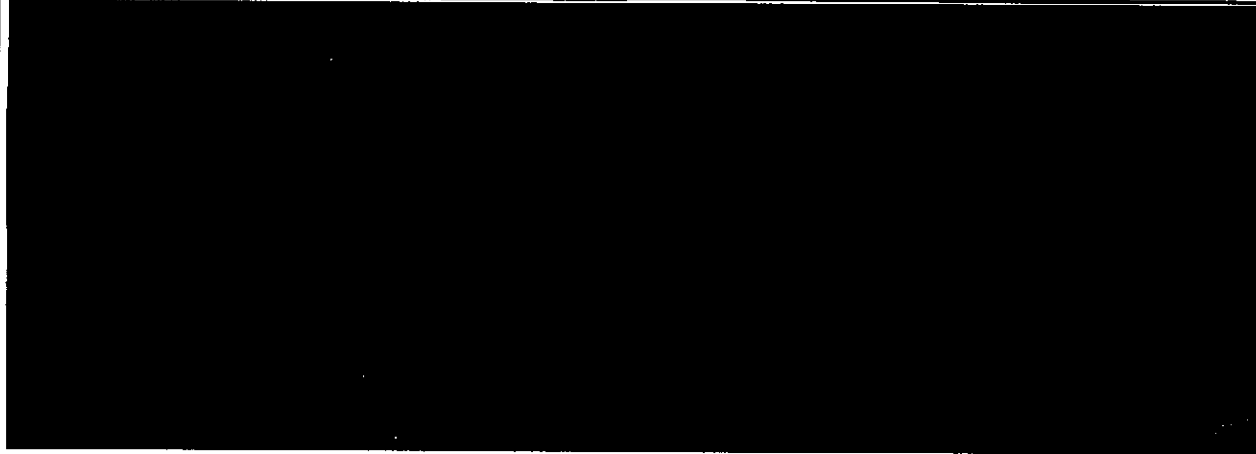

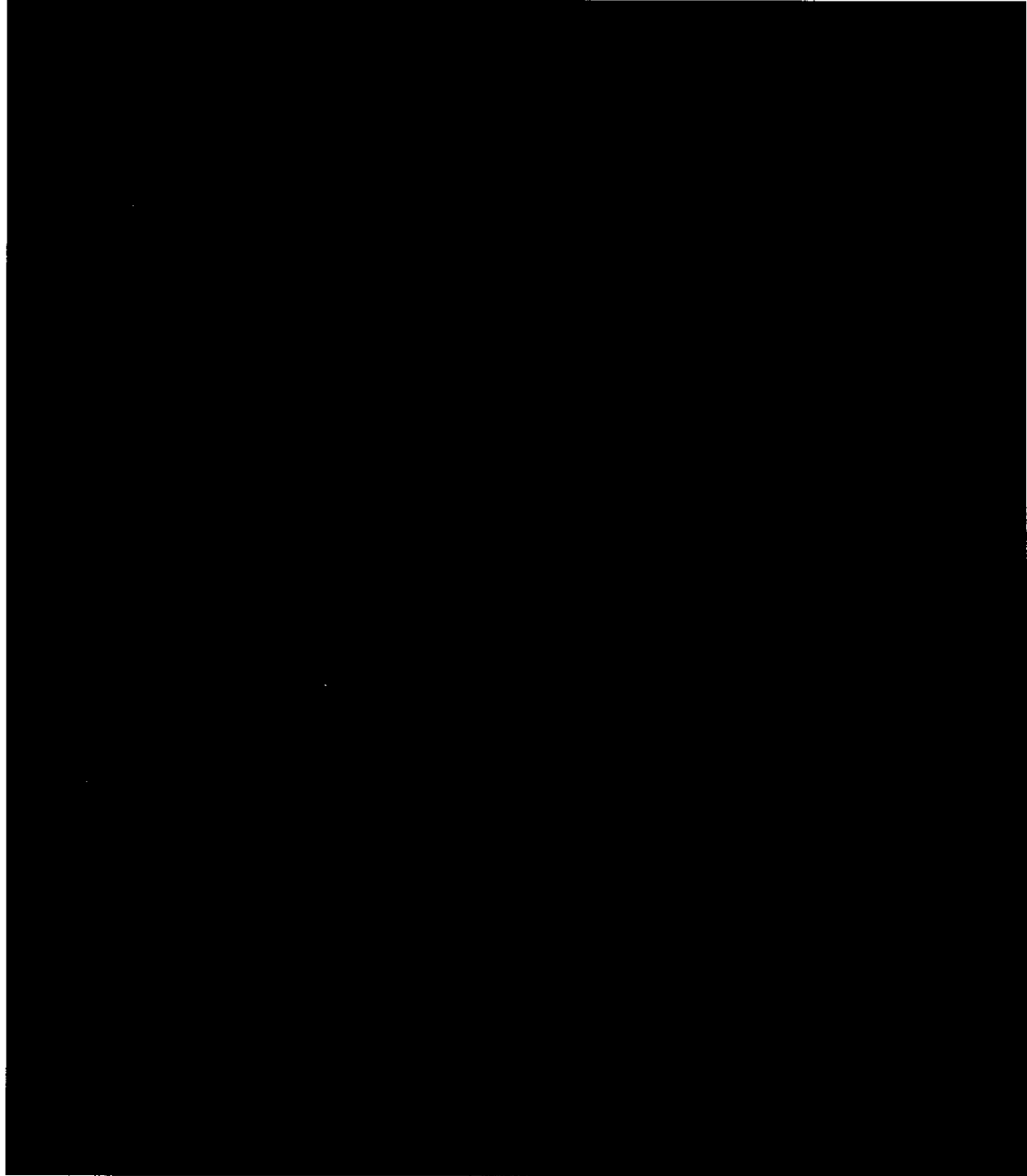

When asked why, [REDACTED] stated after serving UBL for that long in the position of a guard, UBL would have a lot of trust in the individual's loyalty, and the guard would then be given new missions, such as delivering messages or recruiting new members. When asked about the criteria UBL used in choosing a guard, [REDACTED] stated it was based on the individual's performance at Al Farouk, which was evaluated by his instructors and [REDACTED] would prepare a final report that he would forward to the Military Commanders, such as Muhammad Al Masri, [REDACTED] and Abu Hafis. Additionally, UBL favored Yemenis and Saudis to be his bodyguards. Finally, the individual had to be willing to swear Bayat to UBL. [REDACTED] stated all individuals got picked to be bodyguards based on these criteria, and if they were not coming directly from Al Farouk, they would be judged based on the bravery and loyalty they had shown on the battlefield.
